

The past year has been a challenging and very successful period for Very Special Kids. Our standards of care and the flexibility we offer families has never been stronger, while we continue to plan for growth and enhanced services.

2018-19 achievements

- Engaged with 111 new families, whilst maintaining support for over 830 families throughout Victoria.
- Successfully achieved reaccreditation against the National Safety Quality Health Services Standards.
- Developed a new Strategic Plan for 2019-22 with four key strategic goals:
 - o Pursue service excellence
 - o Strengthen financial independence
 - o Optimise organisational capability
 - o Leaders in family-centred paediatric palliative care
- Through strong fundraising events, community support and responsible expense management, achieved an operating surplus of \$355,143.
- Developed a theory of change model that will influence our services in the future, and provide a stronger narrative to the qualitative impact of our support for families.
- Appointed as the charity partner of the Victorian Racing Club's Melbourne Cup Carnival and it's Pin & Win campaign.

A new hospice

Evident to Very Special Kids' desire to provide the best support for children and their families, it was announced in March that our hospice would be rebuilt, creating a world class centre for paediatric respite and palliative care.

Very Special Kids, in conjunction with the University of Melbourne, has been working on a hospice upgrade project for a number of years. After researching international best practice, a new hospice has been designed to replace the existing one, which was built in 1996. The \$7.5 million contribution from the Federal Government towards the rebuild has provided a huge boost, significant funds as well as important validation of this project.

While there is still plenty to plan and prepare, including how we will maintain respite support during the rebuild, the project is on track to start late 2020 or early 2021. We would like to acknowledge the tremendous support from the Federal Government, and in particular to Kelly O'Dwyer for her long-time devotion to our cause. As well as the generous ongoing support of the Chain Reaction Challenge Foundation who provided the catalyst funding for this important project in 2017.

Our Army of Champions

Each year our work is supported by an army of champions. Without our dedicated staff, board of directors, foundation members, over 1,000 volunteers, the Department of Health & Human Services, tens of thousands of individual donors, many wonderful organisations including 7NEWS, 3AW, ALH Group and Commonwealth Bank Australia, along with in-kind assistance from many, we simply would not stretch, reach or function with the same impact. Very Special Kids is about people helping people, and we are unwavering in our belief that we are strong for families because our Army of Champions are strong for us.

Our hope

When working alongside our families it becomes evident that hope remains a constant during their often long, complicated and emotional journeys. Hope changes when you are confronted with the heartbreaking reality of a child with a life limiting condition, but hope endures. There are many ways one could describe our work in supporting families but fundamentally we want to help each family find and sustain their hope, for their special child and their family unit. Our families continue to inspire our efforts, and they are always our inspiration.

A sincere thank you to everyone who has helped provide much needed services to our families. We couldn't do what we do, without you.

We support families during the toughest and most unforgiving time of their lives. From the point of diagnosis through to adulthood or bereavement, we are with families as long as they need.

A research project was conducted between March 2018 and June 2019 to measure the impact of our services across end-of-life, respite, family support, bereavement sibling programs and volunteer programs.

Firstly, we developed the Theory of Change framework to serve as the foundation and identify the outcomes to be measured. All families who access our services were invited to respond to a detailed questionnaire about their experiences and opinions. Results demonstrated the unquestionable impact our services have for families during their most difficult times. Special thanks to The Incus Group for their support with this project.

The Waring family

As a family, what we have found invaluable is Very Special Kids' support for bereaved siblings. But it is more than just bereavement support, it is about building confidence and self-esteem.

A cancer journey is one that no family wants to face. Even more difficult when the family loses two family members only a month apart.

Marmaduke Henry-Waring was 14 months old when he was diagnosed with Neuroblastoma (a solid tumour) and died aged four, only a month after his mum, Millsom, died from breast cancer.

For the Waring family, it was in the aftermath that Very Special Kids had the biggest impact.

Father Simon Waring said their family's first contact with Very Special Kids was when everything was crashing down.

"By that stage my wife was dying and was in hospital and I was bringing the kids in to see her, and Marmaduke was also terminal. I was juggling a nightmare," he said.

From the first meeting with their family support practitioner, the focus was mostly on how to support the siblings, Felix (now 14), Rafferty (now 9) and Charlotte (now 24).

"We identified quite quickly that a volunteer would be good for one of my boys who was really struggling."

After Millsom died, Marmaduke had five weeks of palliative care at home before he died in September 2012. At the time, the family had a lot of care and support from a range of organisations but it was after both funerals that the support of Very Special Kids made a real difference.

"When you're coming out of a cancer journey, siblings are often a casualty. Time, focus, resources, everything is naturally focused on the sick child. After the funerals, we came up for air and once the boys had got a bit of stability back, they were in a position to do more activities," Simon recalled.

"A volunteer was organised reasonably quickly, and she was great."

She turned the attention back on Felix and Rafferty to make them feel important.

"It was far more than providing a distraction. To have someone just come around and do what they wanted; play games they wanted to play and take their suggestions has been invaluable. They didn't have to be quiet, or well behaved. It was about engaging them, connecting with them," Simon said.

In the early stages of grief and in the years since, the family has accessed a range of support including counselling for Simon and Charlotte, attending Lord Somers Camp, staying at Annie's Cottage and regularly attending the Family Christmas Party.

"It has been a bit of a mixed bag really. I have always found Very Special Kids to be nonjudgmental, very open, very generous," he said.

"They have an understanding of the multilayered impact grief has on the different members of the family."

The family also still has a family volunteer to connect with Felix and Rafferty.

"The volunteer program has been amazing. That people just turn up and give their time to be supportive and watch the kids grow up is humbling to watch. It is hard to put a value on it."

Strategic Plan 2019-22

A new strategic plan has been developed to take Very Special Kids through to 2022. The plan has an updated vision and mission, new belief and four high level goals the organisation will work towards over the next three years.

Federal Government grant for hospice rebuild

In March, the Federal Government announced a \$7.5 million grant to help rebuild our hospice with state-of-the-art and best practice clinical facilities to better support children of every age, size, cultural background and functional capability.

National Safety and Quality Health Service Standards

In December 2018 we were successfully re-accredited against the National Safety and Quality Health Service Standards for another three years, confirming that our clinical care is the same standard as hospitals across Australia. Families, health professionals and our community of supporters can be assured that Very Special Kids is delivering the best possible care.

Impact Measurement Research

A project to measure the impact of Very Special Kids provided some fantastic quantitative and qualitative data. The data demonstrates the value and importance of the services we provide to families during their most difficult times. Special thanks to The Incus Group for their support with the research. We will continue to evaluate and innovate to deliver programs that are effective and efficient.



Intake and Assessment Coordinator

A newly created Intake and Assessment Coordinator role started in December 2018. This role is vital to increasing hospice efficiency by ensuring all available beds are filled and care is offered to as many children as possible. The role also provides a continuous point of contact for new families from referral through to assessment, providing a greater level of support to families. Laura Moyes is pictured above with Jett.

Allied Health Team

Very Special Kids has been growing the Allied Health Team in the hospice and we were thrilled to add a Child Life Therapist in 2019. The Allied Health Team now includes art therapy (in partnership with Creative Art Therapy Australia), Music Therapist, Physiotherapist and Child Life Therapist who work collaboratively to provide holistic support to children during their stay in the hospice.

New care management system

An exciting project to implement a new electronic care management system is underway. The system will deliver efficiencies in medical record keeping and reporting, better support the delivery of high quality care, as well as make referral, admission and other information sharing processes for families faster and easier.

Closed Bereaved Sibling Group

A new initiative providing a therapy group for bereaved siblings started in May 2019. Siblings aged between 8-12 years attended four sessions with a facilitated parent group running concurrently. Feedback from both of the groups was outstanding.

Most Outstanding Achievement by a Young Volunteer

In May 2019 a Very Special Kids volunteer Jamilla McCoy, won a Victorian Health Minister Award for The Most Outstanding Achievement by a Young Volunteer. Once again a recognition of the positive volunteer culture that is fostered at Very Special Kids.

Keeping Strong Program

Thanks to funding from the Geelong Community Foundation, parents in the Barwon region participated in a series of workshops exploring different stress management techniques. Feedback from parents was overwhelmingly positive.

75% self-funded

Very Special Kids has continued to grow its revenue streams and in 2018-19, 75% of funding was raised through successful events, major gifts, grants and other fundraising activities. The remaining 25% was income from the Victorian Department of Health and Human Services and investment income.

Meeting regional challenges

The Road to Respite program is continuing to provide transport for regional families who find it challenging to access respite due to their location. In partnership with Royal Flying Doctor Service, we have completed 73 transfers transporting children between their family homes and the hospice, totalling over 450 hours on the road. This program has been made possible thanks to funding from William Buckland Foundation.

Glen Osmond Farm

Our Events

Treadmill Challenge

Over 1,300 runners, joggers and walkers kept 36 treadmills in continuous motion for 24 hours for the 24 Hour Treadmill Challenge in May. The event, which attracted AFL players, politicians, TV personalities and the community that have been touched by Very Special Kids, raised over \$1 million. IS TRUE

The highest fundraising corporate, ALH Group, raised \$168,000 and the highest fundraising team, Seb & Charlie, raised almost \$119,000. Thanks to event partners NovoFit, TRUE Fitness, 7NEWS and 3AW.



Piggy Bank Appeal

Each year, the Piggy Bank Appeal aims to build awareness for Very Special Kids, and raise \$1 million. Five giant pink piggy banks, each three metres in height and weighing 700 kilograms, travel around Victoria on a mission to raise vital funds. Businesses, community groups and volunteers band together to support the appeal through public events and fundraising opportunities in Melbourne and regional Victoria. ALH Group venues, Commonwealth Bank branches, and other supporting businesses create an extensive network across Victoria to hold fundraising events, sell merchandise and collect community donations.

Footy Fever Debate

In August 2018, a contingent of high-profile football personalities engaged in a humorous debate which raised more than \$131,588. Hosted by 7NEWS' Emily Angwin at the MCG, the Very Special Kids Footy Fever Debate tackled the topic 'footballers are funnier than comedians'. Panellists were premiership captains Cameron Ling and Wayne Carey, musician Greg Champion and comedian Dave O'Neil.

Very Special Kids recently held the 2019 event at a new venue, Atlantic Group Docklands, and refreshed the format to raise over \$200,000.





Autumn Classic

The 3rd annual Autumn Classic where teams competed in a virtual cycling race, raised \$132,302. Lowe Finance took home the trophy, and second and third place went to Trivelo and Spiders. Each team went their hardest and it was amazing to see everyone put in the effort. Thanks to event partners The Cycling Fix and Bridged Group.

Other events

Our Annual Fair is held in November on the grounds of Very Special Kids in Malvern. Once again it provided an opportunity to put on a special day to bring the community together.

We also ran two Ladies' Lunches - one in March and one on Oaks Day which collectively raised over \$100,000. Guests were entertained by Matt Tilley and Jules Lund. Thanks to Royal South Yarra Lawn Tennis Club, Liberty Belle Skin Centre and Flowers Vasette.




As we continue to strengthen our financial position through diversification of income streams, we also focus on how we can continue to operate and deliver our services effectively and efficiently to support more families across Victoria.
